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



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Tales and Travel Memories

A growing problem

More than five million Americans have been diagnosed with Alzheimer's Disease and other dementias, a number that is rapidly climbing as Baby Boomers age. Public, academic, and medical libraries can and should play an important role in enriching the lives of this too-often forgotten population.

What is Tales and Travel Memories?

Tales and Travel Memories is an innovative project that provides library services directly to the people diagnosed with Alzheimer's Disease, not just to their caregivers. It has received a positive reception by nursing homes and their residents, demonstrating a real need for serving this special population.

How does it work?

Designed by retired academic librarian Mary Beth Riedner and Gail Borden Public Library District staff and volunteers, the series is offered monthly to diagnosed people at local memory care facilities. Developed in compliance with the International Federation of Library Associations' (IFLA) Guidelines for Library Services to Persons with Dementia, each one-hour program uses the theme of an imaginary excursion to a destination around the globe.

Sample agenda for an excursion:

- Each person is greeted personally as s/he enters the room.
- A globe or large map is used to show each person where s/he is now and where the selected country or state is located.
- Residents take turns reading aloud from a folktale or a story representative of the area. The story has been
 retyped in large font and each person receives a copy to keep.
- Five interesting facts about the location, also typed in large font, are read aloud by the residents.
- Highly illustrated books about the destination, selected from the library's adult and children's collections, are distributed. The residents browse through several books at their own pace.
- Music, souvenirs, coloring pages, flags and sometimes food can be incorporated into the program.
- Informal conversation with library staff and volunteers adds a personal and social touch to the program. Be

Read Aloud Folktale, Legend or Myth:

Both stories below are from Tales Our Abuelitas Told: A Hispanic Folktale Collection by F. Isabel Campoy and Alma Flor Ada:

"The Goat from the Hills and Mountains": This is the story of a goat who steals food from a garden, and the clever ant who gets rid of him. It includes repetition, humor, and dialogue. Although it is short, there are many interesting characters (family, goat, ant), and lessons on politeness, kindness, and generosity.

"Martina Martinez and Perez the Mouse": This is a longer selection. This is the story of how Martina wins her love, Raton Perez, only to have him fall into a pot of soup! But don't worry – everything ends well. There is dialogue, humor, and a variety of characters, both animal and human. One possible concern


Remember to:

- Greet each person individually
- Use a globe or large map to show each person the starting point and destination
- Engage people in informal



Read-aloud Story

- Folktales, myths, legends, historical/biographical stories
 Most often found in children's folktale collections
 Retype in large font; easier to read
- Length four to five typewritten pages
- Universal themes love, cleverness, origin tales. Avoid violent tales.
- Stories with humor and dialogue are the most fun to read aloud





The Goat from the Hills and Mountains
