
While there have been as many different ideas expressed at meetings as there have been participants, there is one first and (Continued on Page 2)



- 2007: 10-year management agreement w/ IRRRB
- 2009: Renamed Minnesota Discovery Center
- 2017: Management agreement extended to 2027






Discover: transitive verb "To make known or visible"

Nature of Collection's Presence in Archives

- Intentional / Proactive: "... publications depicting the history of Minnesota make little or no mention of the people of Vermilion Lake."
- Incidental: Hibbing-Chisholm Women's Club records (1923-1982)
- Ancillary: Tower-Soudan historical photographic collection (1883-1967)

- College publications such as catalogs and magazines
- College, departmental, and committee documents
- Over 150,000 images including photographs, slides, and negatives



 Offered by the Minnesota Digital Library, a service of Minitex;
 free digitization; need to apply to be accepted.
- 2. Arcasearch (http://arcasearch.com/)
 Company based out of Cold Spring, MN; digitizes documents; hosts files; creates an online database.
- 3. Islandora (https://www.mnpals.org/services/islandora/)
 Product of PALS; uses an open source digital asset management system; hosts photo, document and audio/visual files; creates an online database.



Medweganoonind Library & Archives: The Tribal Archives for Red Lake Nation





Materials in the Archives Include:

- Oral Histories
- Ojibwemowin Language Resources
- Photo albums, scrapbooks, yearbooks donated by tribal members
- Pow-Wow Photos & Music
- Red Lake Basketball History
- Tribal Council Minutes & Resolutions (1960s-present)
- VHS tapes of community events (1970s-early 2000s)
- Sacred Objects (not available for public viewing)



The Challenge is TRUST

- Historical Exploitation of Native communities for purposes of non-Native research
- Very little is available online of the collection
- Rich collection, but it is still mostly unknown to even the community

STEP 1: Build Trust

- Instead of being told what the archives can be, they were shown by students, our future generation of leaders and knowledge keepers




